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ABOUT THE WORKBOOK

Many people want to work, need to work, and can work—even with a mental illness diagnosis. In fact, work often plays a central role in recovery. Work does not mean the same thing for everyone though. It can be paid or unpaid, full-time or part-time, in the regular job market, or part of a program that offers special support.

This WORKbook provides information about programs that help people prepare for, get, and keep different kinds of jobs. It also includes information that is important to people with a mental illness who are looking for a job, such as benefits, or questions to ask about a program.

For example, some people worry that they may lose benefits if they get a job, and then if they leave their job, they will be unable to pay their rent. The Benefits section of this WORKbook will explain how you can avoid that problem.

We have tried to make sure the information here is accurate and clear. However, you should always contact agencies directly to make sure they offer what you want. In addition, because the terms used here can be interpreted to mean different things, this WORKbook may not capture the exact meaning of a particular service or job type as used by all agencies.

EMPLOYMENT RESOURCES AND SUPPORTS

People with mental illnesses who are interested in working have a lot of questions. One of the most critical issues is benefits.

Work incentives allow many people on SSI and SSDI to work and receive benefits. If you need help figuring out how to access services, call the Coalition of Behavioral Health Agencies at 212-742-1600 for assistance.

Benefits

Social Security Programs and Benefits

Described below are many of the Social Security benefits and programs important to consumers, especially those who are planning to return to work. Individuals can get information from the Social Security website (www.ssa.gov), or at their local Social Security office. You can also call (800) 772-1213 (or (800) 325-0778 if you are hard of hearing) for the location of these offices, and for general information. Phones are answered Monday through Friday, from 7 AM to 7 PM.

Many consumers receive SSDI or SSI benefits from the Social Security Administration due to their disability. The SSDI (Social Security Disability Insurance) program is for disabled individuals who have paid into the Social Security system via payroll taxes while working, or who have parents or spouses that have paid into the system. The SSI (Supplemental Security Income) program is a needs-based program for disabled individuals with limited income and resources. SSDI and SSI are two distinct programs with separate rules governing eligibility and work incentives. For up-to-date information, go to

Work Incentives

If you are an SSDI or SSI recipient, you may wonder how earnings could affect your benefits and your Medicare or Medicaid coverage. Because every person's benefit situation is unique, and depends on factors such as work history, resources, and living arrangements, recipients should get a clear understanding of their personal benefit status and how work will impact them.

Special employment support rules, called "work incentives" make it possible for individuals with disabilities on SSDI or SSI to work and still maintain eligibility for benefits. Each benefit program has different work incentives. Some of the benefit programs include:

- Trial Work Period – allows you to try out your ability to work and still keep full benefits for at least nine months.
- Extended Period of Eligibility – after the Trial Work Period, you have three years in which you can work and continue to receive benefits for any month your earnings are not "substantial" (For 2013, earnings above \$1,040 a month are considered "substantial.")
- Impairment Related Work Expenses – you medical condition may require you to take a taxi to work, or you may need to pay for counseling services. These expenses may be deducted from your monthly earnings to help you qualify for benefits.
- Plan for Achieving Self Support (PASS) – If Social Security approves your plan for work, any money used for that purpose will not be counted when figuring out how

your income and resources affect your payment amount.

- **Expedited Reinstatement of Benefits** – after your benefits stop because your earnings are “substantial,” you have five years to request your benefit be reinstated without filing a new application, if you again become unable to work.

Ticket to Work

Ticket to Work is a Social Security Administration initiative to help people who receive SSDI and/or SSI return to work. The program lets you choose the services you receive. The goal of the program is to help you earn enough money so that you will not need to depend on cash benefits. Those eligible for this program are people on SSDI or SSI between the ages of 18 and 65. Medicaid Buy-In for Working People with Disabilities (MBI-WPD)

This state program allows many working individuals receiving SSDI to earn more than the allowable Medicaid income limits and still keep their health coverage. Working people with a certified mental or physical impairment can apply.

(As of June 2013, there is a moratorium on premium payments.)

Medicare Part D

Many consumers worry about losing prescription drug coverage when returning to work. Consumers eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid (*dual eligibles*) now get prescriptions only through Medicare Part D.

Some Medicare Part D eligible consumers are also eligible for a federal Low Income Subsidy (LIS), which eliminates or reduces premiums and deductibles. Dual eligibles are automatically enrolled in both the LIS and Medicare Part D programs. Dual eligibles do not have premiums or deductibles and pay only very low co-payments. ACCES-VR (formerly VESID)

Adult Career and Continuing Education Services - Vocational Rehabilitation (ACCES-VR), formerly known as Vocational and Educational Services for Individuals with Disabilities (VESID), offers a full range of employment and independent living services for people with disabilities. ACCES-VR recognizes that all persons with disabilities can benefit from vocational rehabilitation services, and should have opportunities to work in jobs in their communities.

Counselors guide individuals through programs to reach their employment goals. Often this occurs through referrals to community based providers for services such as vocational assessments, vocational counseling, help transitioning from school to work, job training and placement, job follow-up, and other services that support employment objectives.

ACCES-VR may help with sponsoring education and training opportunities to develop the skills needed for specific careers. ACCES-VR works in partnership with the business community, vocational rehabilitation providers (including many of those listed in this directory), and other agencies, labor organizations, and schools.

Getting services involves an application, a determination of eligibility for services, vocational counseling, and the development of an Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE). To apply, contact your local ACCES-VR office directly, or get a referral from a health care provider, treatment center, or rehabilitation program. Go to www.acces.nysed.gov/vr/ for more information.

One-Stop Centers

In New York City, One-Stop Centers, or Workforce I Career Centers, are multi-service career centers with several public and private agencies situated in a single location. They offer one-stop shopping for employment, education, and training services to meet the many needs of job seekers. Partners with offices at the One-Stop include the Department of Labor, NYC's Human Resource Administration, ACCES-VR, the Department for the Aging, and others.

Some of the free services at the Centers include workshops on how to search for a job, resume and cover letter preparation, faxing resumes and telephoning employers, Internet access to job search web sites, computer skills assessment and workshops, job placement services, training opportunities, and Veteran's services. Information is also available on popular professions, Unemployment Insurance benefits, and vocational rehabilitation.

In addition, the Centers provide help with issues not directly related to jobs, such as services for senior citizens; emergency assistance, including utilities and food; education assessment and student financial aid application assistance; English as a Second Language classes; GED and adult literacy information; and help with benefits, such as childcare, Medicaid and other health insurance.

There are more than one One-Stop Centers in every borough, and some boroughs have up to four different locations. COORDINATING WORK AND RECOVERY

Coordinating employment programs, benefits, and recovery can feel overwhelming. No wonder many people, regardless of whether they are peers, feel the hardest part of a job is finding it.

To make sure you understand the pros and cons of your options, and you get the services or program that is best for you, you may want to ask program staff some questions, such as:

- Is there a waiting list to get in? If so, how long do I have to wait?
- Do I need a referral?
- Do I need to be determined “eligible”?
- How do I qualify for services at this program?
- Can I explore what kind of job I would be good at?
- Do I have to complete any requirements before I can get help with looking for a job?
- How long will it take me to get a job?
- What kind of job can I get?
- When I get a job, will I be working with other consumers or on my own?
- Where will my job be located and how long can I keep it?
- If I am in a training program, do I get paid? How much?
- Is there flexibility if I cannot participate in the program?
- Who helps support me on the job? What kinds of supports are provided and how long do they last?

- What happens if I do not like my first job or it does not work out? How quickly will I get help with finding a new one?
- Do you offer any kind of peer support?
- Who can help me with my cash and medical benefits?
- What other services do you provide besides employment services?

And of course, when you are talking with a counselor, reading help-wanted ads, or going for an interview, there are questions you may want to ask yourself:

- Will this position help me learn and grow closer toward becoming the person I want to be?
- Will this job be a stepping stone towards realizing my dreams, or the dreams I may have when I am farther along the road to recovery?
- Even though I would rather be starring in an action film in Key West, or signing up with the Yankees, or designing silk wedding gowns, or even just fantasizing about such scenarios, can I accept that the reality of work will not be glamorous in the beginning?
- Can I keep my dreams, knowing that I will not be a star before I've developed new skills and a track record, starting with entry level jobs? Can I remember that for most people, "overnight success" takes a lifetime of work?
- Can I struggle with a job that may be boring, or underpaid, or have a long commute, or a boss who doesn't understand me? Can I pay my dues? Can I live one day at a time?

- Can I do well at work while I look for a better way to earn a living, or go to school to learn new skills?

Throughout your search, and in whatever path you choose, we wish you the best in recovery. Go for it! And when you debut in your action film, or show your first collection of silk gowns, don't forget to let us know. We'll be waiting to hear from you.

SOME DEFINITIONS

Job Types

When people talk about jobs, they are not only talking about what is considered “competitive employment.” There are actually a variety of options:

Competitive Employment

These jobs involve real work that are paid at a competitive wage and that occur in integrated settings (i.e., disabled and non-disabled employees working together). Many times, supported employment services are offered. In supported employment, the person working is connected to a vocational professional who checks in with both the worker and the employee to make sure everything is going well, and provides ongoing support and assistance.

Internships

These positions involve real work that may be paid, typically in the form of a small stipend, or, more usually in this economy, unpaid. Sometimes internships include mentoring. Like volunteer jobs, internships offer experience, training, time to socialize with other people, and a way to build up a resume.

Transitional Employment

Transitional Employment jobs are provided through Clubhouse programs. Clubhouses provide members with part-time positions (typically 15-20 hours a week) that are temporary, and last from 6 - 9 months. These jobs are located in the community, and employers directly pay these workers minimum wage or more. Often this work helps members gain work experience, and build a work history by trying out different positions.

Volunteer Jobs

These jobs involve real work, but without salary or wages in return. While volunteer jobs are unpaid, these positions offer other rewards, such as experience, training, time to socialize with other people, and a way to pursue your interests.

Work Among Consumers

These types of jobs involve working with other consumers with on-site professional support from a mental health counselor or job coach. Workers are paid at least minimum wage. These types of jobs can help people develop the confidence to work in a more integrated setting. Work among consumers is often done through an “affirmative business” (described on page 18).

Program Models

There are several different kinds of programs for people with mental illness that focus on employment, including:

Clubhouses and Psychosocial Clubs

These programs promote recovery and reintegration into community life. While each club has different services and degree of structure, many resources are typically available. People with mental illness can socialize together, learn about recovery, and sometimes work side by side with staff to achieve vocational goals. They may then graduate to short-term Transitional Employment positions (part-time positions of six to nine months designed to teach new skills and encourage comfort in the workplace).

Job Placement and Support

These are programs that help people get and keep jobs. Several different kinds of programs fit into this category, including Assisted Competitive Employment (ACE), Supported Employment (SE), and job placement programs.

Job Readiness and Training

These programs prepare people to enter the work world. Some programs train participants in specific skills, such as building maintenance or computers. Others are more general readiness programs and focus on a range of skills, such as workplace behavior or GED or literacy. *Adolescent Skills Centers* are job readiness and training programs just for teens and young adults.

Treatment Programs with a Vocational Focus

There are two mental health treatment program models that include a heavy focus on

employment – PROS (Personalized Recovery-Oriented Services) and IPRT (Intensive Psychiatric Rehabilitation Treatment). Both IPRT and PROS programs provide a range of employment services, including job readiness, development, placement, and support.

- **PROS** are programs for adults with severe mental illness that focus on recovery and rehabilitation. PROS programs provide treatment, support, and rehabilitation, primarily through a combination of groups, clinic services, vocational services, and other supports.
- **IPRTs** are designed to help consumers select **employment**, housing, education and social network goals.

Peer Specialist Training

These are programs that train people with mental illness to become peer advocates and experts. Training typically covers peer wellness and coaching, cultural competence, harm reduction, group facilitation and leadership skills, computer literacy, and other skills necessary for providing services to peers.

Work Among Consumers

These types of jobs involve working together with other consumers with on-site professional support from a mental health counselor or job coach. Workers are paid at least minimum wage. Working with other consumers can help people develop the confidence to work in a more integrated setting. In this **WORKbook**, all the work among consumers programs are affirmative businesses.

Affirmative businesses are small companies that are staffed primarily by people with mental illness who work together in settings such as contracted cleaning services, thrift stores, newspapers, and other small businesses. They

offer consumers the chance to work together, for minimum wage or more, as a unit on a job site. Training, supervision, and ongoing support from a job coach or supervisor, who may be a mental health professional, is provided. Often, work in affirmative businesses is viewed as a training ground for work in more integrated settings, including competitive employment.

Services

The programs listed in the WORKbook offer a variety of services. A description of each of these services is included below:

Benefits Assistance

This service helps job seekers understand how work may affect their cash and health benefits, such as the complicated rules and regulations for getting and keeping SSI or Medicaid, and how the job seeker's own financial well-being might be affected by employment.

Career and Economic Self-Sufficiency Planning

These services focus on person-centered planning to help people advance in their career, and plan for financial self-sufficiency. Staff may provide or arrange for benefits planning so that a working person knows how any proposed career changes will affect his or her benefits. Economic self-sufficiency planning includes benefits assistance, as well as counseling to improve credit, work on taxes, build up assets, or reach other goals.

Job Coaching

Getting hired is just the first step. Job coaching helps with what comes next – whatever is needed to help a person get started and settle into a new job, such as acquiring work clothes, dealing with transportation, budgeting for costs associated with going to work, interacting smoothly with colleagues, and keeping the job.

Job Development

This service helps people find and get jobs that match their career interests or strengths. Depending on individual preferences and agency resources, job developers may be minimally or extensively involved with contacting employers and locating jobs.

Job Placement and Support

This category includes placement programs, such as Assisted Competitive Employment (ACE), which help people find and maintain satisfying jobs in local business and industry. These programs may provide skills training, additional supervision, and support. Supported employment programs also fall into this category.

Job Retention

These tailored services, on or off the job site, help consumers stay employed. Support might include disclosure counseling, help with negotiating job accommodations, or solving problems that may interfere with work.

Work Readiness Skills

There are a lot of skills needed in the workplace. Job readiness and training services help people learn important workplace skills, such as getting to work on time, answering the telephone, and using the computer.

THE WISDOM OF PEERS

Ashley



A few years after being fired from her first job, Ashley was ready to get "back in the game." She returned to a retail setting where she could show her skills as a team player, work her hardest, listen to her boss, and do the task at hand. She enjoyed learning her new responsibilities, like putting anti-theft devices in the umbrellas and handling customer questions on the floor.

Her advice to other peers? "Go for it, be charming, be a team player. Bring a lot of jewels to the game!"

Frederick

Frederick worked at a variety of jobs arranged by Venture House, a psychosocial club in Jamaica. Venture House staff also walked him through the paperwork, and reduced the anxiety of starting a new job by accompanying him to work in the beginning, and doing the job with him. This meant someone at Venture House would know how to do Frederick's work, and could replace him on any day he got sick.

"If you lose your job because you're hospitalized," said Frederick, "the people at Venture House say, 'Try again!'"



Michele



Work made me feel less stigmatized because I was doing something that everyone else was doing. I had been in the regular workforce until my early thirties, and I hadn't been out for that long. Still, I needed support at this point in my life.

Michele's advice to peers? "Never doubt yourself. Have the confidence to do something outside clubhouses. It's better to take a risk and fail, than not do it at all. You never know what you can achieve or how far you can go."

Juliet



Juliet tried transitional employment, which was great for her because she knew that "when I first start a job, I need supervision and teamwork."

Now she yearns for a job in her field. "It's not easy to find the right job," says Juliet. But as she looks for it, she holds down another job to pay the bills, and lives by the same recommendations she would give other peers: Show up on time, or early, and let your employer know you have integrity, self-worth, and enthusiasm.

John

John's job lasted eleven years. Now he's looking for a new position which will dovetail with the hours he puts in doing comedy in Manhattan.

For John, a job is critical to recovery: it gives you structure, and a sense of worth; makes you part of a community of fellow workers; and puts money in your pocket.

John has also been able to work, and collect his benefit check—an arrangement some peers are eligible for.

“Do not be afraid to work!” said John.
